Grace and peace to you my brothers and sisters in Christ,

We now are in the season of Thanksgiving, especially for us who live in North America. As we learn in history that Thanksgiving is about the

story of hospitality and generosity; when one of the Indian tribes Wampanoag welcomed and showed hospitality to those Plymouth colonists from England who came with a small ship called Mayflower. This tribe helped those struggled and ill stricken passengers and showed them how to live and cultivate the land in their new world. Then in 1621 the Plymouth colonists and Wampanoag Native Americans shared an autumn harvest feast together as their thanksgiving that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations. More than two centuries later, in 1863, in the midst of the Civil Wat that President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November.

In our Batak tribe of Indonesia for instance, we celebrate 'harvest season' called 'Pesta Gotilon. The people of God in the Bible too celebrated the feast of harvest called Weeks, Pentecost of Shavout. But our thanksgiving is not just limited on harvest but in all God's providence and most of all for his love as the Psalmist called his people in the verse above.

Let's keep that in mind as we enter this Thanksgiving season, count all the blessings that God has given us. Let us continue the legacy of hospitality and generosity toward each other especially the aliens or strangers among us. It is hard sometimes to give thanks when we are in the middle of struggles. Dear Ones,



We move closer to the beginning of Advent, so happy new year! The season of Advent begins the new church year. Sunday, November 28 is the first Sunday of Advent. Have you noticed each Advent our scheduled readings carry themes similar to Lent? We have prophetic themes of justice, quotes from the Hebrew prophets, Mary's

song of praise (The Magnificat) and proclaiming an end to oppression, and imagery such as "baptism with fire. We sometimes call these apocalyptic themes - proclamation of judgement and deliberation, despair and salvation.

Advent is a newer tradition in the church calendar. Centuries ago, many Christian traditions observed Advent as "Little Lent." Like Lent, Advent served as a time of preparation, reflection and reaffirming commitment to following the way of Jesus. In fact, the color of Advent was traditionally purple until about 30 years ago. It is worth noting that over the last 100 years, in the Western church, Advent became closely tied to the commercialization of Christmas - Black Friday shopping day followed by the first Sunday of Advent became amazing opportunities for marketing products to encourage people to buy, and buy more. Commercializing Christmas throughout the Advent season distracts us from the core message of the Gospel. Instead of accumulating, or as one comedian said, "buying things with money we don't have for things we don't want," God reminds us that the new year, the new season, and the new way centers on God's generosity towards humanity. God gave the only begotten Son because God loves.

Christ is coming. In His coming, and in His presence change must occur. As Jesus' body we are now the physical presence of God's word in the world. May His nativity move us as a people transforming and being transformed. The words of the Prophet Simeon:

After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus... they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord...Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon;... and the Holy Spirit rested on him. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace..." And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too."

#### WORSHIP ASSISTANTS - WHY THEY ARE IMPORTANT

#### Lector

The reading of the Scriptures is an integral part of our worship, therefore the role of a lector plays an important part. A lector is a person who doesn't only read the text or script from the Bible but he or she is a proclaimer of the living Word of God. God has important message to his people about his love and his call to mission and the lector will deliver it. He or she brings God's direct voice to his people. As the Psalmist said, "O Lord, open my lips and my mouth shall declare your praise." (Psalm 51:15). That's why at the end of each reading (lection) it concludes with the words, 'The Word of the Lord' or 'Word of God, Word of Life' to which the congregation responds directly to God by saying, "Thanks be to God!"

Typically, especially in our Lutheran liturgy there are three readings; the first reading (The Old Testament reading), the Psalm, the second reading (New Testament reading), sometimes it is called the 'epistle' (letter) then the Gospel. There is a three-year lectionary cycles; year A (Matthew), Year B (Mark) and year C (Luke). A lector is usually a layperson who reads all the readings except the gospel. All these readings prepare the people for the proclamation of the Gospel and sermon that is usually done by a clergy or the preacher on that day.

And because this is an important ministry of worship, a lector should take this task seriously and yet joyfully for indeed it is a great honor and privilege. Below are some of the things that you might consider if you serve a lector:

#### **Before Sunday**

- You should receive the reading from the office if not, please contact the office.
- Please read and rehearse the passage several times before Sunday.
- Review any hard-to-say words, ask for help with pronunciation from a pastor or you may use Biblical Pronunciations App

# **On Sunday**

- Please arrive 15 minutes before service and let the Pastor know you are here.
- Pray before the service and ask God's wisdom and clarity as you deliver God's message.
- Before the service you may check the pulpit to make sure you have the correct readings.
- Upon approaching the altar for the first time in a service, bow briefly to show respect for God and for the church.
- You may gently tap the mic making sure is on.
- Speak clearly and slowly.
- End the first and second reading with 'The Word of the Lord" and the Psalm to be read responsively. The direction should be printed on your readings.

Please remember: "As the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return to it without watering the earth and making it bud and flourish, so that it yields seed for the sower and bread for the eater, so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." (Isaiah 55:10-11).

# MUSIC NOTES

As I write this, the Covid 19 numbers are going back down and thus I am planning/hoping to re-start choir rehearsals in the near future. (We rehearsed for about 5 weeks in July and August, and the first Sunday we were planning to sing for church was when we went back to masks and no singing.) If you'd like to join us in the choir loft we'd certainly love to have more folks who love to sing to the Lord, but please contact me so you know when to show up!

This month we return to spotlighting a hymn, this time one appropriate to sing on the last Sunday of the church year. Christ the King Sunday (Nov. 21 this year) is essentially a magnification of the Feast of Ascension and is fairly new to the church calendar, having been established by Pope Pius XI in 1925.

In *Hymns of the Heart for the use of Catholics* (1851) Matthew Bridges published six eight-line stanzas which began "Crown him with many crowns." The reference is to Revelation 19:12: "His eyes were as flames of fire, and on his head were many crowns..." In 1874

Godfrey Thring, at the request of Rev. H.W. Hutton (who did not approve of Bridges's well-known hymn) published six eight-line stanzas that began "Crown Him with crowns of gold." It was later thought better to rewrite the whole so that the two hymns might be kept "entirely distinct." Hymnals have not been keeping them "entirely distinct" and in our current version of *Crown Him with Many* Crowns (ELW 855) stanzas 1-3 are those of Bridges, stanza 5 is the first half of Bridges's 5 and the last half of his 6. Stanza 4 is by Thring. Amazingly, according to Westermeyer "...the result is a coherent trajectory: an introductory first stanza followed by the story from birth (the "mystic rose" is Mary) to cross to resurrec-tion and the death of death to Christ's rule over the cosmos."

The tune **Diademata** was written by George Elvey for this hymn and first appeared with it in the 1868 Appendix to *Hymns Ancient and Modern*. It is named for the Greek word for "crown"

as seen in the NRSV: "and on his head are many diadems."

The above information comes in part from *Hymnal Companion to Evangelical Lutheran Worship* by Paul Westermeyer and published by Augsburg Fortress.


